# The Year in Review

The year of 2008 was a year of significant achievements by members of the School of Accounting, although in the face of continuing staff losses, with staff continuing to be sought after by other academic and professional organizations.

There was again published evidence of the importance and quality of the research achieved by the School of Accounting. In *Charter* May 2008 a paper written by Smith M, Whale J and Norohha A, detailed the strength of the School's output: "demonstrating the significant superiority of the University of New South Wales in terms of publication performance relative to other Australian universities". The School of Accounting was ranked first in Australia when compared against the Top 24 journals. It was also clearly first on the Top 5 journals. In a ranking of Australian academics publishing in the Top 5 journals, Ken Trotman was ranked 1st and Wai Fong Chua was ranked equal 2<sup>nd</sup>.

The School achieved a large percentage of the ARC Grants allocated in accounting again this year, providing ongoing evidence of the School's valuable reputation: Noel Harding and Ken Trotman for their project *Improving the 21st century audit;* Elizabeth Carson and Roger Simnett for their project *Consistency of going concern audit report modifications over time, audit firms and countries;* and Philip Brown for *Corporate governance, corporate disclosure policies and the timeliness of price discovery: How competitive is the Australian equity market.* 

Roger Simnett and Wendy Green were awarded an ARC Linkage Grant for their project: Improving the Credibility of Greenhouse Gas Emissions Disclosures. Their research is in collaboration with the ICAA and CPA Australia and will enable the development of an international auditing standard on carbon emissions disclosures. Roger's work as co-Chair of the Task Force appointed by the International Auditing and Assurance Standards Board (IAASB) is synchronous with their ARC research in its timing and objectives. Ken Trotman also received an ARC Linkage Grant with colleagues from Monash University and University of Melbourne, and in collaboration with CPA Australia and the Institute of Chartered Accountants in Australia for their project entitled Managing the world's most precious resource: The role of water accounting.

Christina Boedker, and her colleagues Prof Roy Green, Prof John Mathews, Dr Renu Agarwal, A.Prof John Buchanan, Prof Danny Samson, Prof John Van Reenen, Prof Nick Bloom, A/Prof Paul Gollar, Dr Phil Toner, were awarded a large grant from the Department of Innovation, Industry, Science and Research (DIISR) for their research *Impact of Managerial Practices on Firm Performance*. Maria Balatbat, and Prof David Carmichael from the Faculty of Engineering were awarded funding from the 2008 Contestable Funding Scheme for their project *Role of carbon financing in developing nations in mitigating GHG emissions*. The project is in collaboration with Associate Professor Robert L.K. Tiong of the School of Civil and Environmental Engineering at Nanyang Technological University (NTU) in Singapore.

Professor Wai Fong Chua was elected a Fellow of the Academy of the Social Sciences in Australia in recognition of her research excellence over many years. She is internationally recognized for her original and innovative field studies of accounting practices in firms and was one of the earliest researchers to draw upon sociological and organizational theories in the study of accounting. Wai Fong joins eleven other Fellows of the Academy from the Australian School of Business, and is the second Fellow from the School of Accounting.

The Australian School of Business Research Office also awarded 2 of the 5 Outstanding Achievement in Research Awards to Elizabeth Carson and Habib Mahama.

# The Year in Review

Gary Pflugrath and Christina Boedker were awarded their PhDs and, also very pleasingly, three members of staff were successful in gaining internal promotion to Associate Professor: Dr Elizabeth Carson, Dr Mandy Cheng and Dr Noel Harding.

There were also a number of other significant instances of recognition of the performance of our staff. In April, Ken Trotman was presented the *MBT Award for Excellence in Facilitation* at the inaugural Australian School of Business Teaching Awards ceremony for his outstanding performance. Elizabeth Carson was also the winner of the 2008 American Accounting Association Auditing Section Outstanding Dissertation Award. She is the first person outside the USA to receive this very prestigious award, which recognizes her dissertation as being an outstanding contribution to auditing knowledge. Elizabeth's paper *Global Industry Specialization by Audit Firm Networks* was supervised by Roger Simnett. Roger Simnett was also recognized by the AAA Auditing Section for his role in supervising Dr Carson's thesis.

As mentioned at this beginning of this "Year in Review", staff were successfully sought by other institutions, namely Professor Stephen Taylor to UTS and Dr Habib Mahama to ANU. Gary Pflugrath resigned to join CPA Australia and Dr Caitlin Ruddock left to take up a position at van Eyk Research Ltd.

Early this year we welcomed Dr Hwee Cheng Tan to the School of Accounting, along with Trish Strong, Jerry Wei Chen, Hanghang Tu and Yang Li. We look forward to long and fruitful associations with each of them.

It is clear that 2008 has been filled with achievement and recognition and I am proud of the School's staff - both the academic staff and the administration staff. In the coming year 2009 we will again be striving for excellence.

#### **Professors**



Philip Brown BCom UNSW, MBA PhD Chic., FASSA, FCPA

Philip Brown has been a Professor at UNSW since 1 January 2003, with a joint appointment in the Schools of Accounting and Banking and Finance. He is also a Professor in the UWA Business School. Philip's primary interests are in financial accounting and the behaviour of financial markets. His current research projects include measuring share market abnormal performance in the very short term and in the long term, analysts' forecasts, the new equity issue anomaly, corporate dividend policy, tax loss selling, the accounting standard setting process, corporate governance and accounting for share based payments. He has published widely in international journals in accounting and finance, his best known work being "An empirical evaluation of accounting income numbers", co-authored with Ray Ball, which won the American Accounting Association's Seminal Contribution to Accounting Literature Award. In 1996 he shared, with RJ Chambers, the Accounting Association of Australia and New Zealand's inaugural Outstanding Contribution to the Accounting Research Literature Award. In 1978 he was elected a Fellow of the Academy of the Social Sciences in Australia and, in 1992, a member of the Accounting Researchers International Association. In 2000 he was elected a life member of the Accounting and Finance Association of Australia and New Zealand.



Wai Fong Chua BA, PhD Sheff., FCA, CPA

Wai Fong Chua concluded five years as Head of School in July 2006, taking up a new role as Senior Associate Dean of the Faculty of Business. She has been a Professor at UNSW since 1994. Before joining UNSW in 1985, Wai Fong taught at the University of Sheffield (1981-82) and Sydney University (1983-85). Her current research projects include an examination of management accounting change, the role of financial and non-financial controls in intercorporate alliances, knowledge management in professional service firms, and corporate sustainability. Her other research interests include international accounting, accounting history and the philosophy of the social sciences. She has published widely in international journals including The Accounting Review, Accounting, Organizations and Society, Contemporary Accounting Research and the Journal of Management Accounting Research. She was the President of the Accounting and Finance Association of Australia and New Zealand from July 1998 – July 1999. Currently she serves on the editorial boards of several journals. She is also a member of the UNSW Council, the External Sustainable Development Advisory Group to the Minerals Council, the CA Program and Admissions Committee and Academic Board of the ICAA.

Mark Hirst BA, BEc (Hons) MCom (Hons) PhD



**Baljit Sidhu** MCom PhD FCPA, ACA (NZ)

Mark Hirst joined the School after the merger of Australian School of Business and the AGSM, where he was Professor of Management for 14 years and held a number of positions including Associate Dean. Director Hong Kong Programs and Associates Dean AGSM Executive Programs. He has been a Visiting Professor in France (INSEAD), Singapore (INSEAD) and the USA (SDSU). The focus of Mark's teaching is on helping managers create wealth by managing key value drivers in firms including News Ltd, Telstra, Westpac and Rio He is a recipient of the Alumni Prize for Outstanding Contribution to Teaching at the AGSM. Mark's research focus is on strategy implementation and organizational design. He has experience in the design and behavioral effects of organizational control systems. His articles have appeared in leading international journals including The Accounting Review, Journal of Accounting Research, Accounting Organisations and Society, Journal of Applied Psychology, Accounting and Business Research, Behavioural Research in Accounting and Contemporary Accounting Research.

Baljit Sidhu teaches on AGSM MBA and Executive Programs. Her research and teaching focuses on corporate reporting, in particular the informational role of accounting data in contracting and firm valuation. Baljit has extensive industry and consulting experience. Her industry experience includes Head of Facilities and Research in Corporate Banking at Natwest New Zealand. Baljit has held appointments at several leading universities in Australia and New Zealand and visited at the Universities of Rochester and Michigan, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, London School of Economics and the London Business School. Baljit conducts incompany training in the corporate market with clients including NatWest Bank, professional accounting firms (KPMG and Deloitte Touche Tohmatsu) and DHL International. Her current teaching responsibilities at the AGSM are in Financial Statement Analysis in the full time MBA program and on the Executive Program. Her courses demonstrate how to extract performance information from financial statements, what might represent unrealised potential, and where to look for lurking danger.

Roger Simnett MEc Monash, PhD UNSW, FCPA



Stephen Taylor BCom UNSW, MEc Macq., PhD UNSW, CA, FFTP

Roger Simnett became Head of School in July 2006. continues to teach and research in the financial accounting and auditing areas. Roger came to tertiary teaching from the auditing profession. His early years of tertiary teaching were spent at Monash University. Roger's research interests cover a range of financial accounting and auditing topics, including auditor decision processes, development of specialist skills, corporate governance, financial disclosure and sustainability issues. His work has appeared in both academic and professional journals including The Accounting Review, Accounting, Organizations and Society, Auditing: A Journal of Practice and Theory, Abacus and Behavioral Research in Accounting. He is a regular presenter at both academic and professional conferences and seminars, and is also on the editorial boards of a number of journals, including Auditing: A Journal of Practice and Theory, International Journal of Auditing and Managerial Auditing Journal.

**Stephen Taylor** is a Professor of Accounting at the University of New South Wales, and during 2006 served as Associate Dean Research (Acting) for the Australian School of Business. He is also the co-ordinator of the Accounting Quality Research Program funded by the Capital Markets Co-Operative Research Centre. Prior to joining UNSW in February 2003, Stephen was Professor and Head of Accounting at the University of Technology, Sydney. Before that, Stephen was Professor of Accounting at the University of Sydney. In 1999-2000, he was a Visiting Professor of Accounting at the University of Michigan Business School, following an earlier appointment there in 1993-94. Stephen has also held previous faculty appointments at the Australian Graduate School of Management and Macquarie University. The major thrust of Stephen's research focuses on the intersection of financial economics and accounting, including the measurement and implications of accounting quality, how corporations manage their disclosure policies, the effect of accounting and nonaccounting data on firm value, the economics of auditing, corporate governance issues and initial public offerings. Stephen's research has been published in leading international journals, including the Journal of Accounting and Economics, Contemporary Accounting Research, Journal of Financial and Quantitative Analysis, Journal of Corporate Finance, Journal of Banking and Finance, Journal of Accounting and Public Policy and Journal of Business Finance and Accounting.

### Professors (cont'd)



Kenneth Trotman MCom PhD UNSW, FCA, FCPA

Ken Trotman is a UNSW Scientia Professor. He was Head of the School of Accounting from 1991 to February 2000. He joined the University in 1974 and has held visiting appointments at a range of overseas institutions including University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, Cornell University and the University of Michigan. His main research interests are concerned with behavioural decision making in accounting. This research involves the examination of the processing of information and the quality of decisions made by both users of accounting reports and by the accountants. He has a particular interest in the judgments made by auditors and in developing decision aids to improve their judgments. He has written six books and published in the leading research journals including The Accounting Review, Journal of Accounting Research, Contemporary Accounting Research, Accounting Organizations and Society, Auditing: A Journal of Practice and Theory, Abacus, Accounting and Business Research and Behavioural Research in Accounting. He was the 1993/94 Coopers & Lybrand Visiting Professor and the 1993/94 President of the Accounting and Finance Association of Australia and New Zealand. He was Director of Research for the Audit Section of the American Accounting Association. In 1998 he received the AFAANZ 'Outstanding Contribution to the Accounting Literature' award and was elected as a Fellow of the Academy of Social Sciences. He received the 2001 'Outstanding Auditing Educator Award' from the Audit Section of the American Accounting Association and in 2002 was awarded life membership of AFAANZ. Ken is on a range of editorial boards of international research journals and is presently Associate Editor of Auditing: A Journal of Practice & Theory and recently appointed incoming Editor of Auditing: A Journal of Practice & Theory from July 2008.

### **Associate Professors**



Jane Baxter BCom W'gong MCom (Hons), PhD UNSW, FCPA

Jane Baxter, an Associate Professor, joined the School of Accounting in August 2006, having worked previously at the University of Sydney. Jane teaches both postgraduate and undergraduate students. She teaches in the areas of management accounting, strategy/management and research methods. Jane specialises in qualitative research methods and studies contemporary management accounting in its organisational context. She has published in a number of internationally refereed journals and has contributed to books on management accounting and distance education courses in the field.

Andrew Ferguson BCom UNSW, BBus GCert PhD UTS, CA

Andrew Ferguson is an Associate Professor in the School of Accounting. He teaches and researches in financial accounting and auditing. His research work has appeared in peer reviewed Academic Journals including The Accounting Review, Contemporary Accounting Research, Asia Pacific Journal of Accounting and Economics, Pacific Basin Finance Journal, Accounting and Finance, Accounting Research Journal, JASSA, Australian Accounting Review, and Australian Journal of Management.



Malcolm Miller MCom UNSW, FCA, FCPA, FCIS, FAIM

Malcolm Miller is an Associate Professor, Associate Head of School, Program Director for the Master of Professional Accounting, and School Co-ordinator for its two specialisations in the Master of Commerce. He undertakes teaching and research in financial accounting and reporting, with interests in accounting standard setting, financial reporting regulation and international accounting. In 2003 he received the Outstanding Contribution to Practice Award of the Accounting and Finance Association of Australia and New Zealand, and a Vice-President of the International Association for Accounting Education and Research (2000-2002). He was a member of the Consultative Group to the Australian Accounting Standards Board from 1998-2003, member of the Australian Accounting Standards Board 1992-1995, and a member of the Public Sector Accounting Standards Board 1987-1989. He was Visiting Scholar at Reading University in 1995, and Visiting Assoc. Professor at New York University 1977-8 & 1983. He held a senior position in the Sydney office of KPMG prior to joining the University in 1971. He has published extensively; research monographs for the Australian Accounting Research Foundation, and papers in The Accounting Review, Accounting and Business Research, Australian Accounting Review, Advances in International Accounting, Accounting Forum and Charter.

Richard D. Morris BCom Qld, MBA PhD UNSW, FCPA

Richard Morris is an Associate Professor in the School. His teaching responsibilities are in financial accounting at undergraduate and postgraduate levels. His research interests are in financial accounting, international accounting, and accounting history. They include the impact of IFRS adoption in Australia and the EU, international harmonisation of financial reporting. corporate transparency in the Asia Pacific region, financial reporting and the Asian and Russian financial crises of 1997-98, the evolution of financial reporting in Britain and Australia during the 19th century, and the economic factors associated with accounting choices made by firms. His work has appeared in international refereed journals, professional journals, monographs and chapters in books. Richard is the School's Undergraduate Studies Director. He also coordinates the School's staff mentoring scheme. Prior to joining the School, he worked in the auditing section at Price Waterhouse.

Jeff Coulton is a Senior Lecturer in the Australian School of Business at UNSW. Before joining UNSW, Jeff was a lecturer in the School of Accounting at UTS and prior to that at the University of Sydney. In 2006 he was teaching at the University of Texas at Austin. Jeff worked as a solicitor for Corrs Chambers Westgarth for a number of years before returning to academia. Jeff's research interests include voluntary disclosure, executive remuneration, corporate governance and earnings management, and he has published articles on earnings management, the disclosure of executive compensation and corporate governance. Jeff's current teaching interest is in the area of financial statement analysis; focusing on business strategy analysis to inform the use of accounting information and other public disclosures in firm valuation. He has also experience in teaching financial reporting courses.

Wendy Green is a Senior Lecturer at UNSW who teaches Auditing and Assurance Services. Wendy came to tertiary teaching from the auditing profession and has been a UNSW staff member since 1985. Wendy researches in the discipline of auditing, completing her PhD dissertation examining auditors' analytical procedures judgments in 1999. Wendy's research to date includes work on audit qualifications in Australia and in emerging markets, auditor switching, audit committees, auditor judgment and auditor specialisation. This work has appeared in both Australian and international refereed journals and has been included in refereed conference proceedings both in Australia and internationally. More recently Wendy has undertaken research on financial disclosures in emerging markets, audit partner rotation and assurance of Greenhouse Gas Emissions Reporting.

Noel Harding joined the School in 1994 after completing his undergraduate Honours degree at Macquarie University. He subsequently completed his MCom (Hons) and PhD degrees. From 2001 to the middle of 2005 he was based in China teaching in, and managing, the Faculty's MCom programs in that country. Prior to joining the School, Noel worked in a number of chartered accounting firms. He teaches financial accounting and auditing at postgraduate level. Noel's research interests are the behavioural aspects of financial accounting and auditing. His research has been presented at international conferences and published in international journals including Accounting, Organizations and Society and Contemporary Accounting Research. Noel is a past Vice President of the Australia-China Chamber of Commerce (South China) and until recently was a member of the CPA Australia Shanghai Group Committee. 



# **Peer Assistance Support Scheme**

**Peer Assistance Support Scheme (PASS)** is a scheme of peer tutoring. Third year Honours students lead groups of first year students in Accounting and Financial Management 1A and 1B. They share their experiences and skills with the first years to ease the transition to university life. Accounting PASS continued to be popular with students in 2008, with 12 PASS groups running in both Session 1 and 2.

The scheme is a voluntary one with students attending whenever they feel the need. The scheme provides students with the opportunity to discuss specific questions and concepts encountered in tutorials and lectures with a group of fellow students and a PASS leader. There is also the opportunity for the discussion of more general areas of concern for first year students, including the enhancement of study skills.

PASS sessions are conducted in a more relaxed and informal environment than lectures or tutorials as leaders do not award grades. All students, irrespective of academic ability, are encouraged to participate. Experience has shown that there is an improvement in performance of those students who attend six or more group meetings during the session.

Leaders are selected at a training day conducted by the Education Development Unit in conjunction with the School of Accounting. They reported that they benefited from their involvement, noting that the scheme helped them revise some of the basic accounting material and provided a deeper understanding in various areas. Each year a number of PASS leaders continue their involvement with the School by working as full-time or casual tutors while undertaking honours or postgraduate studies.

# Co-op Program

# **Honours Program**

The Honours Program provides advanced research-oriented training in accounting to academically outstanding students. It deals with theoretical, analytical and empirical research issues in Accounting not covered in corresponding pass courses. The Honours Program provides talented students with an opportunity to extend their analytical and empirical analysis skills, attributes that are eagerly sought by premium employers in consulting, investment banking, business and government. The Honours Program also provides a gateway to further research-oriented study, such as the doctoral program at UNSW or elsewhere.

The Program begins in third year with additional classes and reading materials, and then progresses to an additional year of study, commonly known as the Honours Year. Students who have an average mark of 75% or better in first and second year accounting subjects, and whose programs allow it, are invited to join the third year honours program. They must maintain a minimum average mark of 75% in their accounting subjects to remain in the program.

The fourth year Honours Program consists of four subjects covering "cutting edge" research issues in financial accounting, managerial accounting and auditing, as well as research methodology. Students also complete an honours thesis. The fourth year Honours Program is very demanding and is equal in quality to comparable programs offered by the best universities overseas.

Honours studies in accounting bring many rewards. Since 1996, 13 First Class Honours graduates from the School have been awarded University Medals. Tony Abrahams (Honours 1, University Medal 1997) and Clinton Free (Honours 1, University Medal 1998) both won Rhodes Scholarships to Oxford University. Gerlinde Gniewosz (Honours 1, University Medal 1998) completed an MBA at Harvard University, and Nicole Ang (Honours 1, 1997) completed a MA at Stanford University.

The Honours Program has also been a source of academic staff in accounting at UNSW and at other Universities. Staff of the School in 2007 who are products of our Honours Program include Professor Stephen Taylor, Professor Philip Brown, Associate Professor Malcolm Miller, Dr Wendy Green, Associate Professor Elizabeth Carson, Associate Professor Mandy Cheng, Dr Helen Kang, Paul Andon, Nicole Ang and Kerry Humphreys. Elsewhere, Professors Ray Ball (Chicago) and Garry Marchant (Bond) are among some of the best known of UNSW's accounting honours graduates currently on the staff of other Universities.

The Accounting Honours Alumni Network, launched in 2003, has continued to enable honours graduates to keep in touch, to liaise more readily with the School and to participate in discussions on accounting research and professional developments.

2008 was another outstanding year for the Honours Program. Three of our students graduated with First Class Honours and the remaining three students received Second Class Upper Division. In particular, I was delighted to see Jim Chuang won the 2008 University Medal. Three of our Honours students, Jim Chuang, Nicolette Landsbergen, and Deirdre Tshien also represented the School at the Faculty's Annual National Honours Colloquium in August 2008. The success of the Honours Program is directly related to the efforts of the many staff who teach, supervise and mentor the Honours students and I wish to thank those staff involved for their assistance over the past year. In 2009, the Honours Program will be co-ordinated by Associate Professor Mandy Cheng.

### **CEPP Program**

### (Commerce and Economics Preparation Program for Indigenous Australians)

The School of Accounting participates in the Commerce and Economics Preparation Program for Indigenous Australians (CEPP) initiated by the Faculty of Commerce and Economics (now the Australian School of Business) in 2001. It is a free program offered to indigenous people who wish to discover their business potential. It is run annually over a four-week period. Successful graduates of the CEPP are offered a place in the Bachelor of Commerce or Bachelor of Economics degrees at UNSW.

Topics covered in the program include: Accounting and Business Finance, Business Law and Taxation, People Management and Business Communication, Economics and Marketing. The accounting component covers introductory topics such as the role and users of accounting information, the five basic groups of accounts, the accounting equation, an overview of the financial statements and budgeting. An instructional video on One-Tel, produced by CPA Australia, is shown in class to illustrate the relevance of accounting in practice.

### **Academic Staff Mentoring Program**

Mentoring is defined as a relationship in which a more experienced person acts as an adviser to a less experienced colleague, providing guidance and support over a period of time. Mentoring has been introduced in many organisations including universities, as an effective way of addressing many staff development needs. The School of Accounting has a formal Mentoring Scheme focused on the research, teaching and related career development of Levels A and B academic staff. Staff at these levels are invited to participate. The advantages of the Scheme include:

- 1. Advice on making progress with a higher degree or other research
- 2. Discussing research ideas
- 3. Advice on teaching and course administration
- 4. Advice about career, settling into academic life etc.

The research focus addresses the difficulties faced by more junior and early career academics in establishing a productive research program. The teaching focus recognizes that those staff often need academic advice on teaching issues early in their careers. The Scheme includes individual mentoring by more senior academic staff and also includes occasional seminars on topics of common interest. Mentoring arrangements are subject to bi-annual review, the most recent being in 2008. The Scheme is very popular among junior staff in the School.

## **Teaching – Postgraduate**

#### **Postgraduate Coursework Programs**

The School offers many subjects in the postgraduate coursework programs of the Australian School of Business. The biggest School program is the Master of Professional Accounting (MProfAcc). In Semester 1, 2008 and Session 2, 2008 the total enrolments in the MProfAcc and the extended version of the program were 576 students and 580 students respectively. These enrolments were higher than those in corresponding semesters in 2007 (485 and 514). In Semester 2, 2008 for the first time there were more students enrolled in the extended 17 unit version of the program (343 students) than in the 13 unit version of the program (237 students).

The School offers two specializations in the Master of Commerce program. The enrolment in the Accounting specialization was 76 students for Semester 1, 2008 and 56 students for Semester 2, 2008. The enrolment in the Strategic Value Management specialization was 11 students for Semester 1, 2008 and 10 students for Semester 2, 2008.

The Master of Financial Analysis (MFinAn) program continues to grow. From Semester 1, 2007 to Semester 2, 2008 the numbers have increased each semester as follows: 85, 190, 288 and 343. The MFinAn is designed for postgraduate students with a major in Accounting and/or Finance and is offered in conjunction with the School of Banking & Finance. By undertaking the program students can study a mix of Accounting and Finance subjects tailored to their needs.

#### MPhil and PhD Programs

The School of Accounting prides itself on being one of the best research schools in the field of accounting, both in Australia and internationally. In part, this is due to the School's diverse and rich PhD and MPhil programs, which have continually nurtured an active research agenda. Student research theses involve a variety of methodological approaches and address issues in financial accounting, management accounting and auditing.

At the end of 2008, 25 postgraduate research students were enrolled in the school, 17 of whom were working towards their PhD. The wide range of topics being researched by the candidates is a strong indicator of both the depth and breadth of the program. Topics include: auditing and assurance; backdoor listings; measuring accounting quality; earnings quality and corporate governance; voluntary disclosure of earnings forecasts; audit judgement studies, audit quality, and auditor independence; continuous improvement, control and creative behaviour; post completion audits and performance of industry specialists; and management accounting control systems issues related to the use of teams and the use of multiple performance measures.

During the year, four candidates were awarded their PhD degrees: Dr Christina Boedker, Dr Peter Carey, Dr Amna Khalifa and Dr Gary Pflugrath.

### John V Ratcliffe Memorial Lecture

The 2008 John V. Ratcliffe Memorial Lecture was hosted by the School of Accounting at the Australian School of Business, Business Lounge, on 11 March.

Professor Ken Trotman as Convenor, introduced Professor Ira Solomon to the large audience of academics, a wide section of the profession and business people.

Professor Solomon delivered a lively lecture entitled Public-Company Auditing Post Sarbanes-Oxley, A Focus on Financial Statement Fraud which explored changes in the business environment at the start of the 21st century, the antecedents to these changes, and then considered the new, greater expectations of the public and regulators with respect to public company auditors. A significant focus was on financial statement fraud, its characteristics, and new ways of thinking about old auditing concepts such as audit risk and audit evidence. He presented compelling examples from the business press, contextualising his ideas with reference to current practices.

Professor Solomon is the R.C. Evans Endowed Chair in Business and Head of the Department of Accountancy University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign. Prior to joining the University of Illinois, Ira was an Audit Research Fellow in KPMG's Executive Office. He has served the American Accounting Association Auditing Section as Research Director, Vice-President (Academic), President (1994-95), and President (1995-96).

The John V. Ratcliffe Memorial Lecture is supported by a fund established by Mrs Florence L. Ratcliffe to commemorate the work of her late husband, John V. Ratcliffe, in the fields of accounting, taxation and financial management.

The lecture is delivered by a person or persons eminent in the commercial world, the profession of accounting or in research in the areas of accounting, finance or taxation.

The John V. Ratcliffe Memorial Lecture is designed to bring together members of the university and persons in commerce, the professions and the public sector to consider issues of mutual concern and public interest.
